Traditionally, the church has taught that the change of the Sabbath to Sunday was part of a great apostasy instigated by theRoman Catholic Church. The edict of Constantine (AD 321) enforcing Sunday worship was seen as a key step in the change. The recovery of the true biblical Sabbath only became possible after the Reformation, and would be a mark of the Remnant Church.

In 1977 Samuele Bachiocchi published <u>From Sabbath to</u> <u>Sunday</u>, documenting the historical transition from the Saturday Sabbath to Sunday in the early Christian church, and also the decline of standards of practice for the Sabbath. It had quite an impact in the academic community and was well received by many. Subsequent to his work, Adventists have emphasized that the move from Sabbath to Sunday was a gradual process, beginning early and still unfinished centuries after Christ, and have relatively downplayed the level of Constantine's impact"
